## Who is Laurel Bill?



Third-generation Alaskan **Laurel Downing Bill** is author of the recently released Alaska history series, titled "Aunt Phil's Trunk." Volumes 1 through 4, which include about 350 historical photographs per book, feature lively stories about Alaska's colorful past.

The series developed after Laurel inherited newspaper clips, research and rare Alaska history books from her Alaska historian aunt, Phyllis Downing Carlson, who died in 1993. It started as a weekly newspaper column in The Anchorage Chronicle in July 2002. The column soon became one of the most popular features in the newspaper chain.

She began developing the series in 2005 and published Volume 1, which covers the Great Land from early Native history up to the Klondike Gold Rush of 1898, in 2006. The next three volumes appeared on the market during 2007, 2008 and 2009.

With press reviews touting her work as "the most well-researched, well-written and fun-to-read Alaska history available," the books now sell all across Alaska from stores like Barnes & Nobles and Wal-mart to small independent bookstores and gift shops.

Born in Fairbanks in 1951, Laurel moved to Juneau in 1959 after her father, Richard Downing, became the state's first commissioner of public works.

Eight years later, she began traveling when her father took a job with a company building roads and bridges around the world. She spent time in Cameroon and Liberia, in West Africa, Tanzania in East Africa, and Indonesia, Hong Kong and Singapore.

She graduated from an American high school in Mallorca, Spain, in 1969, and then attended one year of college in Leysin, Switzerland.

Laurel returned to Alaska in 1970, where she eventually met her husband, Don Bill, in Fairbanks. In 1974, the couple moved to King Salmon – a small village about 360 air miles southwest of Anchorage. There they raised their two children, Kim and Ryan, in the remote community while Don worked as area biologist for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game Commercial Fisheries Division and Laurel worked her way up to assistant general manager for the Bristol Bay Telephone Cooperative Inc.

After 24 years, they retired into Anchorage. That's when Laurel got a chance to go through her late historian aunt's papers. When she saw the quality of her aunt's work, she knew she needed to make it public. And she knew she needed tools to do the job right. So she enrolled at the University of Alaska to learn about writing. Laurel graduated with a degree in journalism and a minor in history in 2003.

During her junior year in college, she took an internship as a copy editor with Alaska Newspapers Inc., which published seven rural weekly newspapers. In July 2002, when the company started a new weekly paper called The Anchorage Chronicle, she became one of its main reporters – and birthed the column, "Aunt Phil's Trunk."

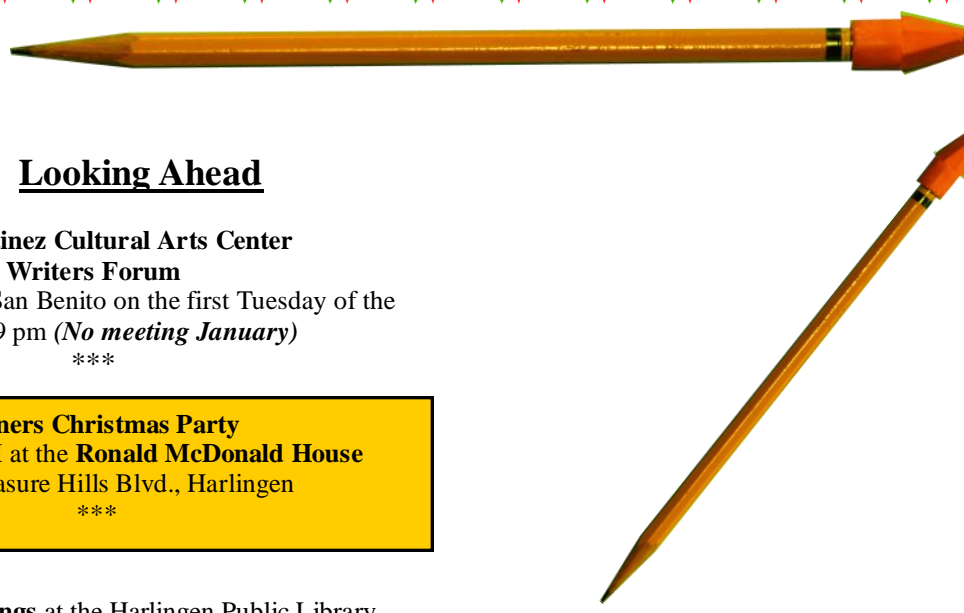
Other award-winning articles she authored include "Life or Meth," a Chronicle story that highlighted methamphetamine cooks, users and undercover cops in Anchorage. It earned sixth place in the nation in a William Randolph Hearst Foundation competition in 2004. "Condo Catastrophes," a four-week series appearing in the Chronicle the same year, covered the shady side of the building industry in Anchorage. It won first place from the Alaska Press Club in 2005.

"Blue Parka Bandit," printed in the Fairbanks Daily News Miner in 2005, told about a gold-rush era highwayman in Alaska's Interior and earned her second-place honors from the Alaska Press Club in 2006. That story appears in Volume 1 of her series.

Laurel is currently writing Volume 5, the last book in her "Aunt Phil's Trunk" series, while she and her husband spend the summers in Alaska and the winters enjoying the sunshine of deep South Texas.

Her presentation will focus, among other things, on mainstream publishing, self-publishing, e-books, how to choose one's topic and identifying the book's audience, and on how to make the prose sparkle. She will also offer tips on marketing plans, book signings, press packages, book reviews, and much more.
